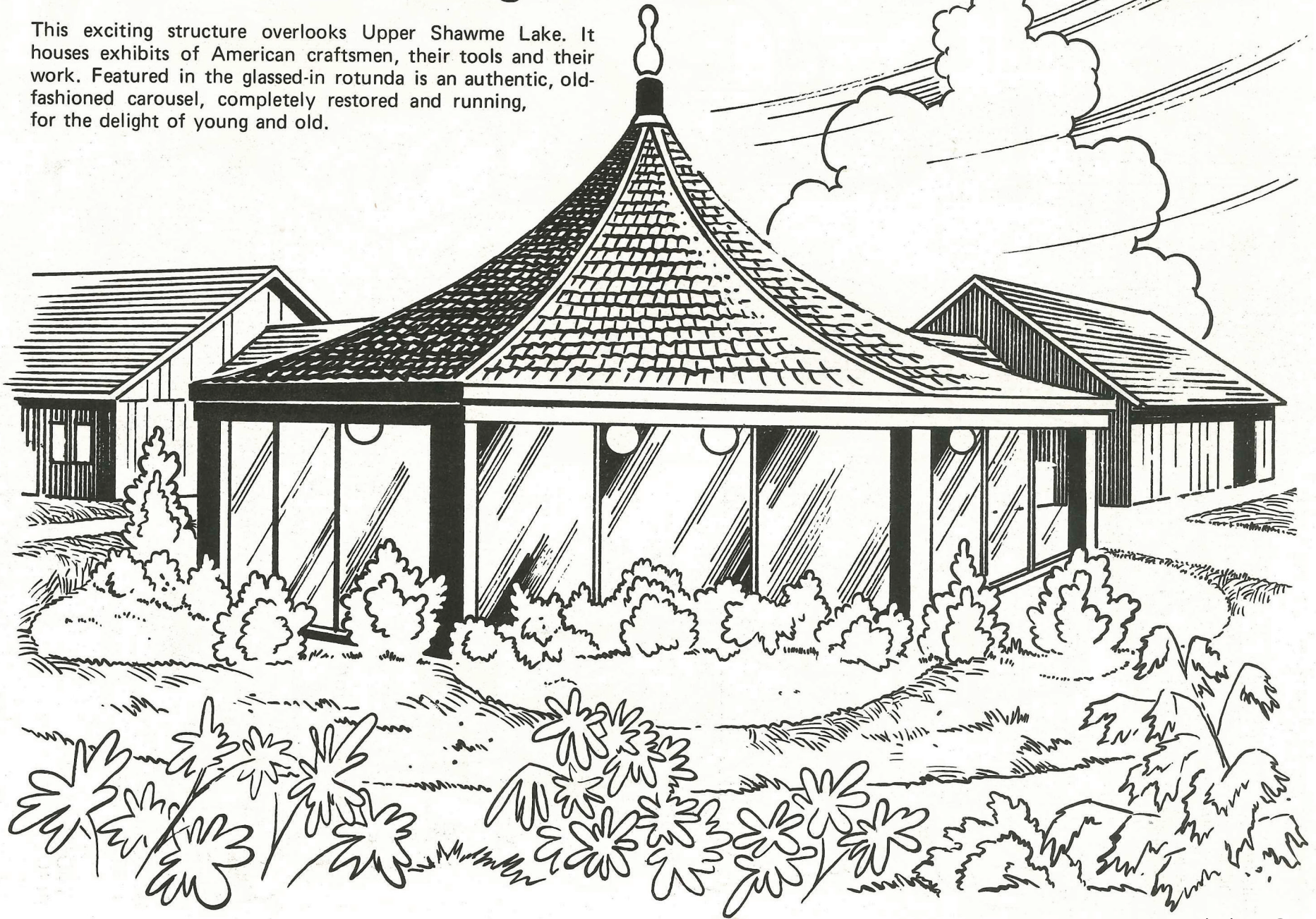
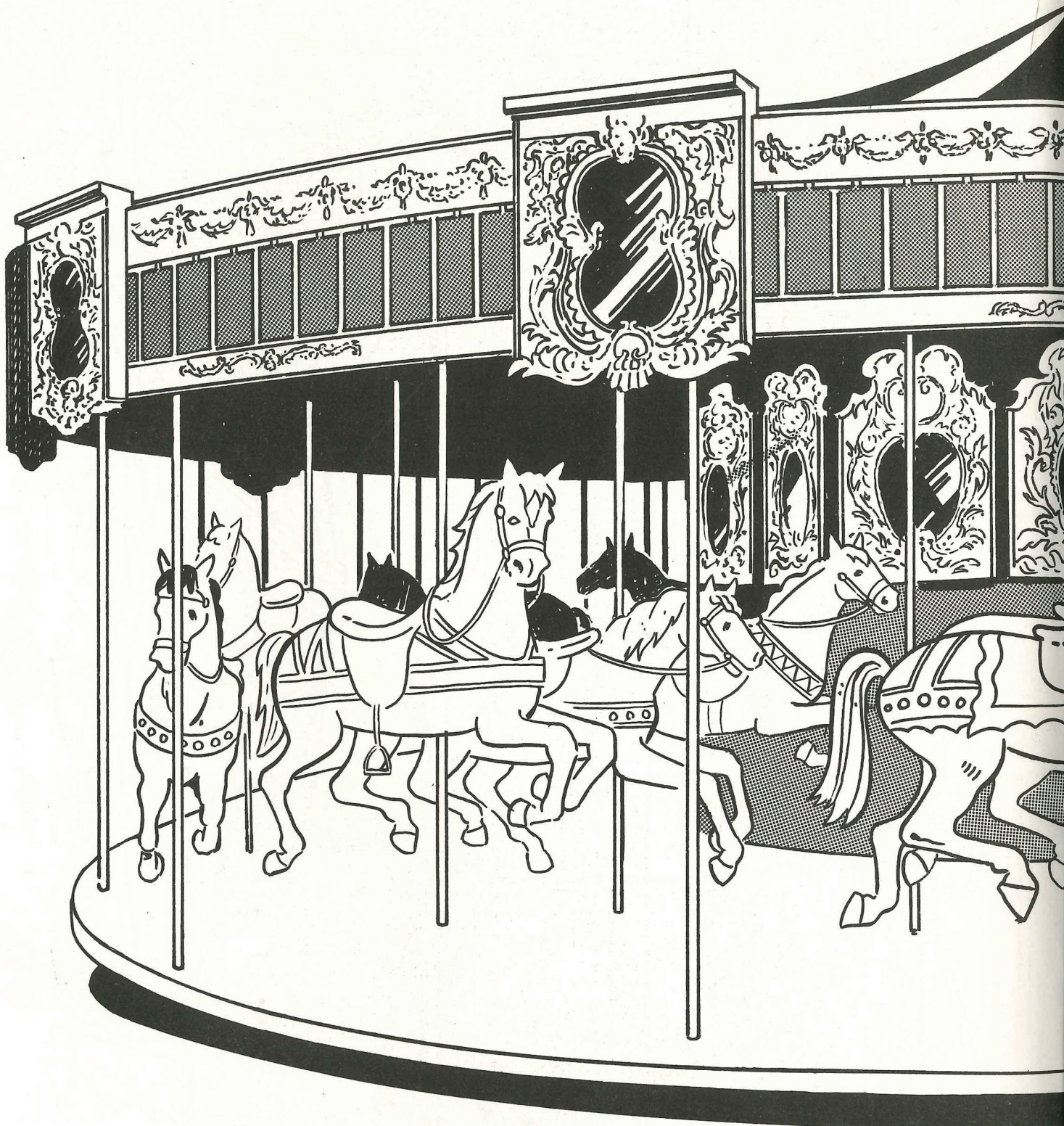


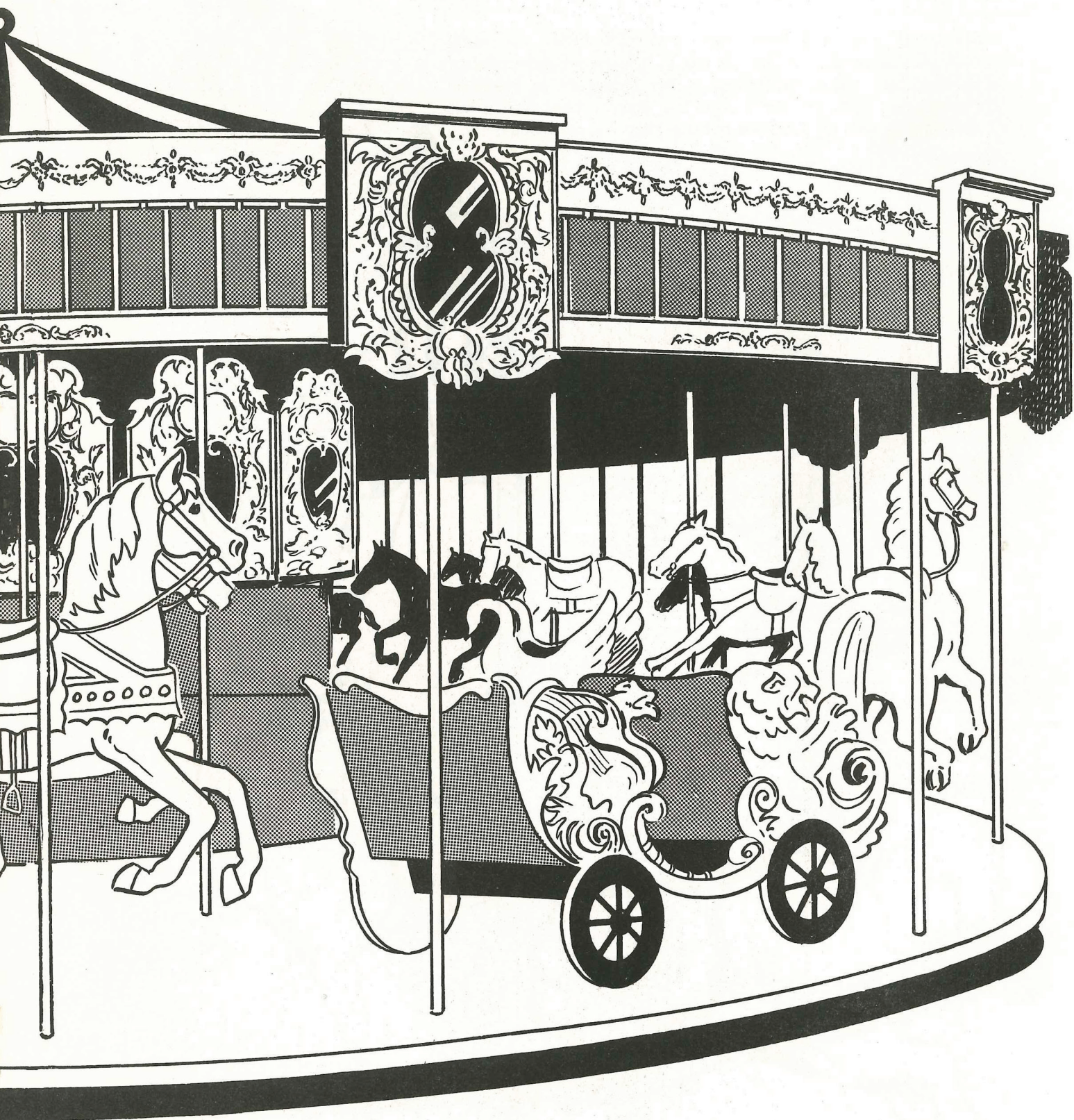
The Arts and Crafts Building

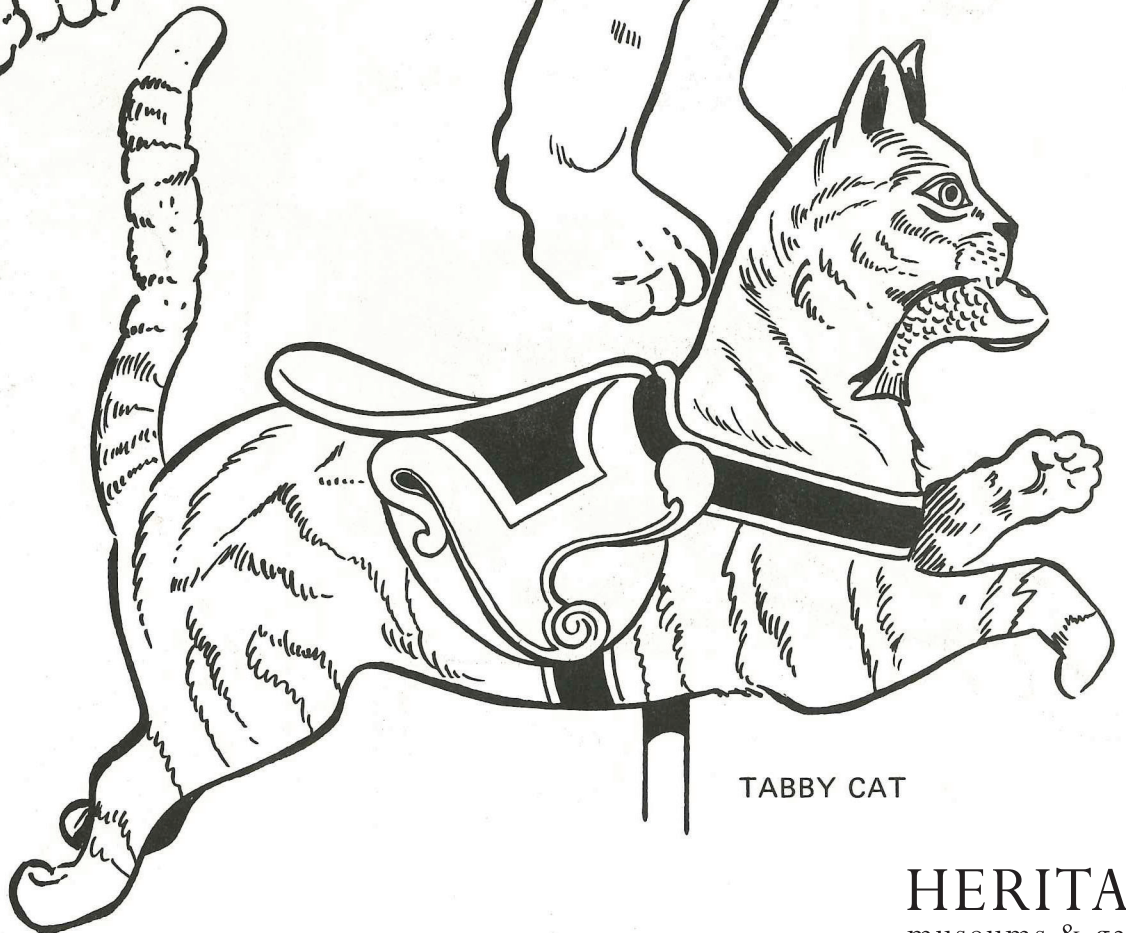
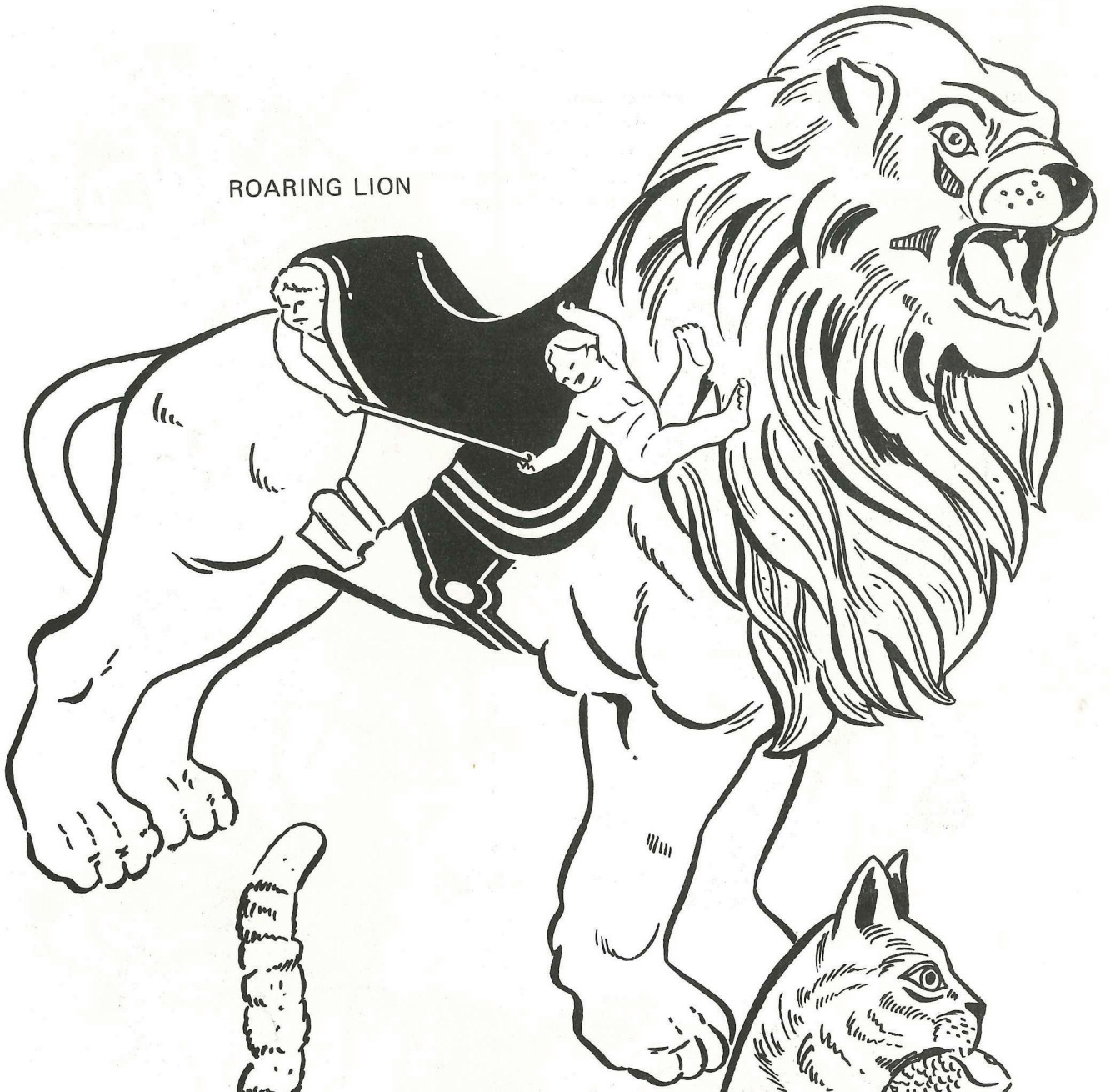
This authentic, completely restored carousel was originally built in Riverside, Rhode Island in 1912 by Charles I. D. Looff who created the first Coney Island carousel in 1876. The animals and gondolas represent some of the finest examples of the "merry-go-round" art.

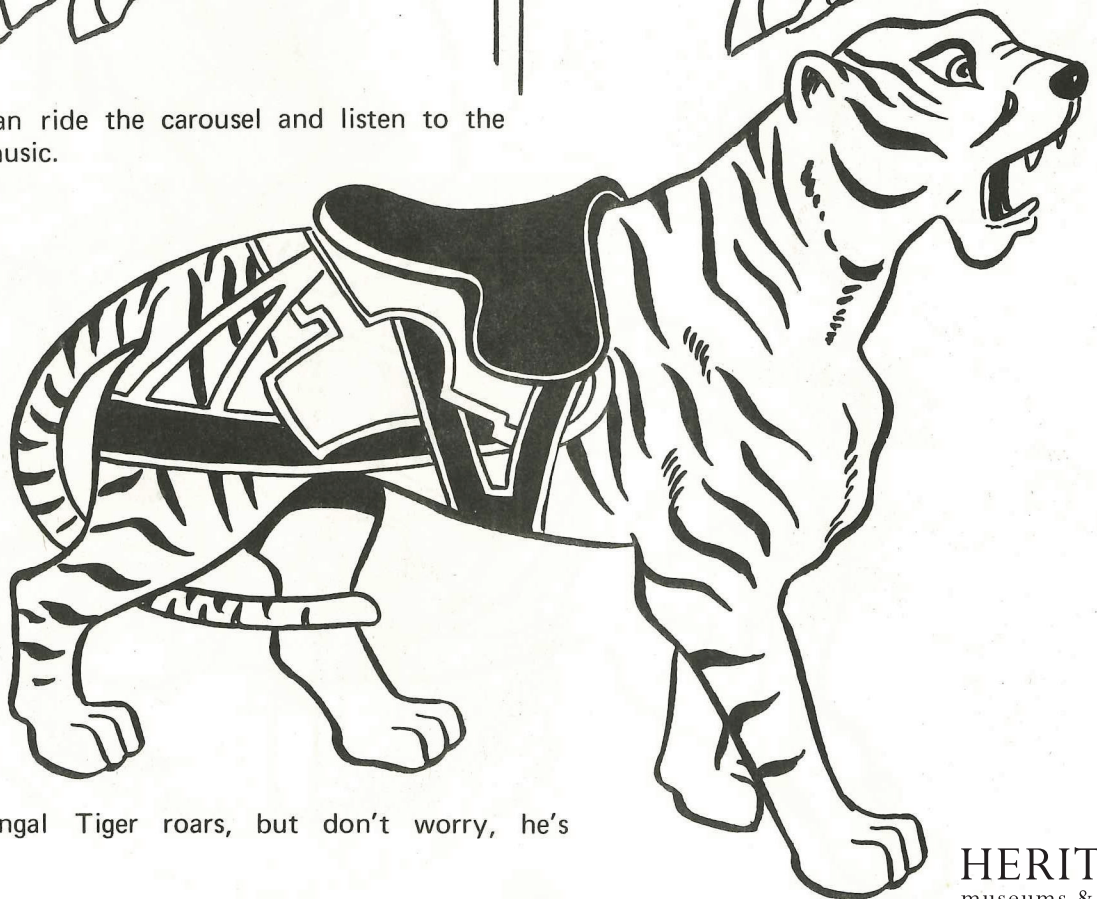

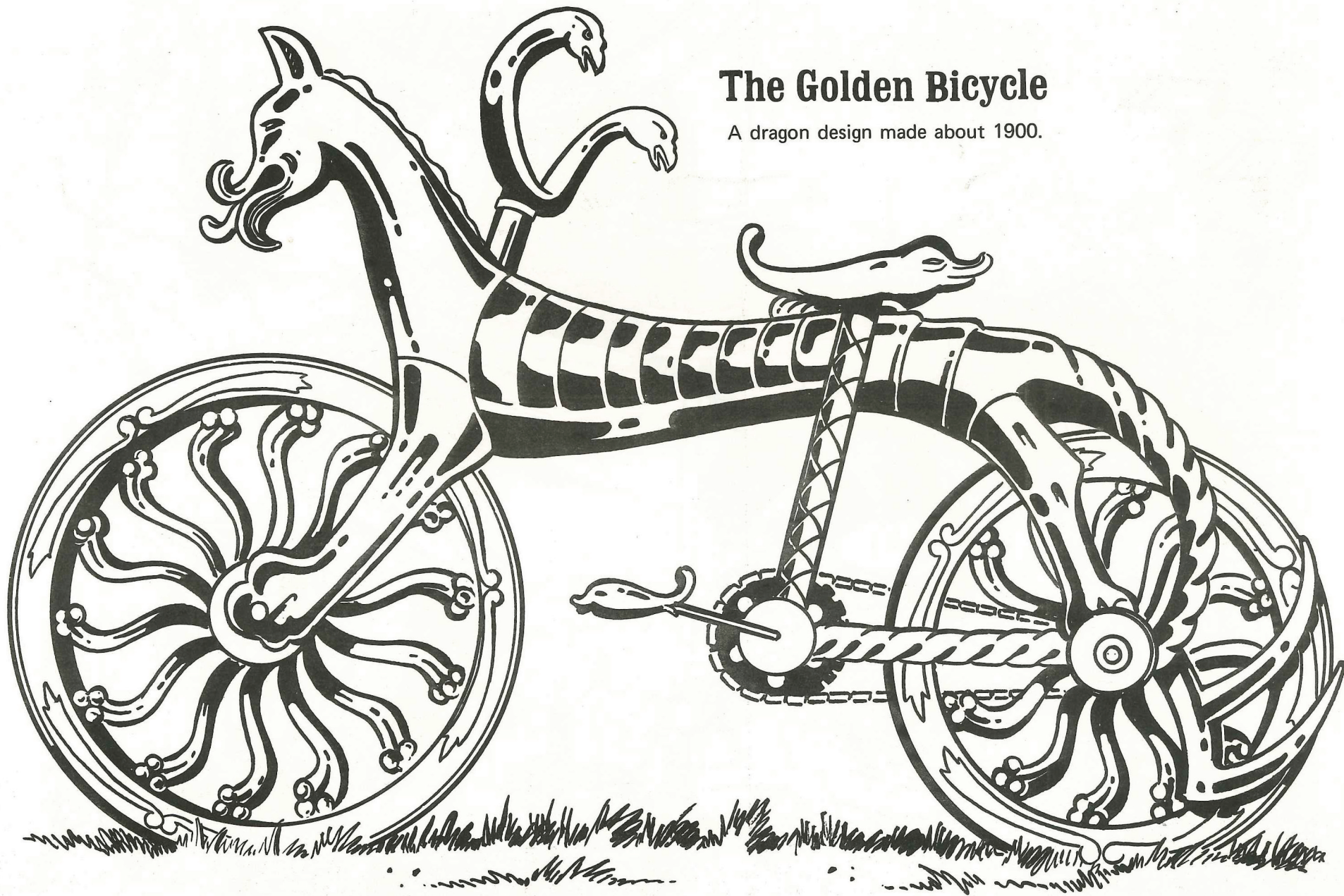
